(The Welcome)

As both Sheila and Ann are away this weekend for a well earned break, it falls upon me to conduct this service.

This is the first time I've taken a service so I do hope you'll all be especially kind to me.

I'm hoping with Steve's help the people on Zoom are able to joining us. Hello Zoomers.

Everyone is welcome whether you come often or are newcomers.

We are just going to have a sing along of five of our chosen favourite hymns, and in order to give us time to rest our vocal chords in between, we will have some Poems, Prayers and Stories selected and read by members of our congregation.

Sorry Zoomers for not asking you to contribute but I hope you will find a hymn or reading that is one of your particular favourites.

I hope you will all sing up, listen to the readings and enjoy!

(Chalice Lighting & Opening Prayer)

And now, as is our custom, I'll begin this time of words, and song by lighting our chalice candle as a symbol of our free religious faith.

(Light Candle)

The chalice prayer I've chosen is "Heritage of Light" by Cliff Reed

We light this chalice to celebrate our heritage of light: the light of science and of art; the light of story and of poem; the light of nature and of reason; the inner light of spirit and of truth.

(My Opening Words)

The 1st of August was the pagan festival of Lammas; the festival to celebrate the first harvest and gathering of the new grain.

The first sheaf of corn was hung over the fireplace in the home and would be ploughed into the ground in the following spring.

The last sheaf cut would be kept for making corn dollies.

Our opening music was the traditional song Scarborough Fair sung by Aurora

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Scarborough Fair was a historic trading market held each August and September in Scarborough, North Yorkshire it was established by Royal Charter in 1253 by King Henry III.

It was a major commercial event attracting merchants from across Europe. The fair was a significant event for merchants to trade goods; and merchants came from as far away as the Ottoman Empire (present day Turkey). The fair typically ran for 45 days, starting on 15th August (Assumption Day) and ending on 29th September (Michaelmas Day).

The fair eventually declined. The last traditional one being held in 1788.

(Opening Hymn)

The first hymn is a firm favourite of most of us Hymn number 24 in the purple hymn book Aptly called 'Come Sing a Song with Me' Words by Carolyn McDade and the music is called "A Rose in Winter" the words will appear on screen. Stand if you're able

Hymn number 147 in the purple hymn book the words will appear on screen. It's called 'Spirit of Earth, Root, Stone and Tree'

It is also called 'This is My Song'

A third verse was added in 1964 written by Georgia Harkness.

Unfortunately it doesn't appear in the hymn book.

And I'd like to read the verse to you before we sing the hymn:

May truth and freedom come to every nation

May peace abound where strife has raged so long;

That each may seek to love and build together,

A World united, righting every wrong.

A World united in it's love for freedom,

Proclaiming peace together in one song.

The closing prayer is a recasting of words by Charles Dickens' written in 1844 as his tribute to the Revd. Edward Tagart.

May our religion have sympathy for people of every creed and venture to pass judgement on none.

May the lessons of Divine Truth sink into our hearts and not be forgotten in our practice.

(Extinguishing of the Chalice candle followed by the closing video and our notices)

(Extinguish Candle)

The closing video is the song "I Am The Earth" It's just the lyrics on a green screen, with a children's choir singing. It was written in 2007 by Glyn Lehmann for the International Year of Planet Earth 2008.

It has been immensely popular worldwide with children's choirs.

Sung in two parts, one part being the voice of the Earth and the other that of the children of the Earth.
